PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Members,

It is with great pleasure that I welcome members to the 51st Annual General meeting of The Australian Davis Cup Tennis Foundation and in doing so present to you for consideration and adoption the Annual Report of the Foundation incorporating the audited financial statements as at 30th June 2022.

For the second year in a row the Covid-19 pandemic impacted much of what we would have liked to do and certainly continued to impact the tennis calendar with events cancelled or played in front of either no or a restricted number of spectators. We are grateful that despite these rather difficult times, members have continued to support the Foundation and we have been able to stay financially stable throughout the period.

Following the cancellation of the 2020 competition, the The Davis Cup by Rakuten Finals took place across Madrid, Innsbruck and Turin from 25 November to 5 December 2021, with Madrid hosting the Semi finals and Final. As a result of qualifying for the cancelled 2020 event, Australia was one of 18 teams to compete in the knock-out stage. Grouped with Croatia and Hungary, we competed successfully against Hungary but fell short to the eventual finalists, Croatia. In the Final the Russian Tennis Federation proved too strong for Croatia. The Australian team, under the guidance of Captain Lleyton Hewitt, put up a strong show with Alex de Minaur winning his singles and teaming with John Peers to win the doubles match against Hungary.

Our 2022 campaign has started strongly after defeating Hungary in a qualification match on the Ken Rosewall Arena in Sydney in March. Australia now moves forward with 15 other countries to compete in the Finals. The round robin format will be played in September and the top two teams from 4 groups will then compete for the title in Malaga, Spain in November. At the March tie, Alex de Minaur was again the stand-out player winning both his singles matches. With the match level at two rubbers all, Thanasi Kokkinakis won the deciding 5th rubber allowing us to progress in the tournament. The Foundation invited members to a luncheon prior to the first day of play where I interviewed Eddie Winter and Charlie Camus who had been invited by Lleyton Hewitt to join the squad as additional hitters. The luncheon was well received by those in attendance.

The ATP Cup team event played at Melbourne Park saw Canada beat Croatia in the final. Australia was placed in a Group with Italy, Russia and France. Australia finished second in the group and failed to make the semi-finals with an opening 2-0 win against Italy, a 3-0 loss to Russia and a 2-1 victory over France.

In all the uncertainty we have been fortunate to still have had other key events played throughout the year and I would like to congratulate Craig Tiley and all at Tennis Australia on the remarkable effort of staging the Australian Open and

summer of tennis in January 2022. With a limit on the number of spectators, through broadcast we were able to enjoy the quality tennis.

The Australian Open started with much controversy surrounding the vaccination status of Novak Djokovic but will be remembered for the great results we saw at the back end of the Tournament. It was great to see Rafael Nadal claim his second Australian Open title while the Australian contingent of players had some great results. Alex de Minaur reached the fourth round of the singles, Nick Kyrgios teamed with Thanasi Kokkinakis to win the Mens Doubles defeating Matt Ebden and Max Purcell in an all Australian Final, while Jason Kubler paired up with Jaimee Fourlis to make it to the Final of the Mixed Doubles. Dylan Alcott ended his professional career with a Grand Final appearance in the Wheelchair Tennis Quad Singles event. No doubt, from an Australian perspective, the highlight of the event was the fantastic achievement of Ash Barty winning the Women's Singles, her 3rd Grand Slam singles title. Little did we know at the time but it was to be her last appearance as a professional tennis player, announcing her retirement from the game in March, 2022. I am sure all members would support me in wishing Ash all the best in retirement. An amazing career carved out by a truly wonderful individual.

In July 2021, we hosted a successful High Tea at Kooyong Tennis Club on the middle Sunday of the Wimbledon Championships. With over 80 members in attendance we were fortunate to hear from Jelena Dokic who spoke openly about her upbringing and assisted me in dissecting the first week of the Championships.


As we move away from the restrictions that have hampered overseas travel in recent years it remains a goal as part of our philosophy to support the up-and-coming new generation by helping to provide opportunities to participate in tournaments domestically and travel overseas to gain valuable experience. This is more important than ever for our junior players as they have suffered enormously in gaining the experience necessary to compete on a world stage by being stranded in Australia during the pandemic. If they are to succeed in their individual pursuits and also in representing Australia, they need our support more than ever.

During the period under review the tennis family was saddened to hear of the passing of Robert (Bob) Parker who over many years made a very significant contribution to the running of the Foundation. His dedication, knowledge and good humour have been sorely missed by the Board and all of our members who knew him.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge and share my appreciation to the Board of Directors for their significant contributions and guidance this past year. During the year our Company Secretary, Alan Cobb announced his retirement after 21 years of outstanding service and we were very fortunate that Anna White agreed to fill the vacancy until the election at the Annual General Meeting. Robert Hinton was elected by the Board to fill the role of Company Secretary. I am extremely grateful to Judy Pullyblank our Office Administrator, Robert Jamieson the Honorary Treasurer, Mary Klestadt for production of our eNews,

web maintenance and communications and Trevor Dohnt for liaising with the office, organising events and preparing the Agendas and Minutes. The time and effort given is appreciated, not just by me but all in the Foundation. We are also grateful to Chris Brown and his team at Kooyong Tennis Club who play host to our Board meetings and various functions.

THE DAVIS CUP

2021 Competition

Following the cancellation of the 2020 competition due to the Covid19 pandemic, the teams that had qualified to compete in 2020 Final were automatically chosen to compete in the 2021 Final Series which took place in Spain in November 2021.

The Final Series comprised of 18 teams initially competing in six groups of three teams, with the six winners plus the two second placed teams with the best record, moving forward to compete in a knock out competition.

Australia was one of 18 teams to compete in the round robin stage of the event. Grouped with Croatia and Hungary, we competed successfully against Hungary but fell short to the eventual finalists, Croatia. In the Final the Russian Tennis Federation proved too strong for Croatia. The Australian team, under the guidance of Captain Lleyton Hewitt, put up a strong show with Alex de Minaur winning his singles and teaming with John Peers to win the doubles match against Hungary.

2022 Competition

Having been knocked out of the 2021 competition in the group stage, Australia had to play in the qualifying Round in March 2022 to compete in the 2022 Final Round.

Our campaign started strongly by defeating Hungary 3 rubbers to 2 in the qualification match. The results of that tie were as follows

Alex de Minaur defeated Zsombar Piros. 7.5 6.2

Thanasi Kokkinakis lost to Marton Fucsovics. 6.7 6.1 3.6

John Peers & Luke Saville lost to Fabian Marozsan & Mate Valkusz. 4.6 4.6

Alex de Minaur defeated Marton Fucsovics 7.6. 6.4

Thanasi Kokkinakis defeated Zsombor Piros 6.4 6.4

Australia now moves forward with 15 other countries to compete in the Finals. Alex de Minaur, Thanasi Kokkinakis, Mathew Ebden and Max Purcell have been announced as our team that will compete in the round robin stage in September. Alexei Popyrin and Jason Kubler will also travel to Germany as apart of the six man squad.

Australia will face Belgium, Germany and France in the group stage. The top two teams in each group will advance to the knock out stage which will be played in Malaga in November where the 2022 Champion will be crowned.

ATP CUP 2022

The 2022 ATP Cup was the third edition of the ATP Cup, an international outdoor hard court men's tennis tournament held by the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP). It was held in January 2022 with Canada defeating Spain 2-0 in the final.

Australia played in the Group B qualifying group finishing in second place but failed to qualify for the finals. The Australian team was De Minaur, Duckworth, Purcell, Peers and Saville.





NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th JUNE, 2021

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

(a) REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

The Company recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity and specific criteria have been met for each of the Company's activities as discussed below.

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

Revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue is recognised when it becomes receivable on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets. Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when performance obligations are satisfied. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(b) INCOME TAX

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less.

(d) GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(e) ACCOUNTS PAYABLE AND OTHER PAYABLES

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability.

(f) FINANCIAL ASSETS

All recognised financial assets are measured in their entirety at fair value.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Company classifies its financial assets into the following category, those measured at:

- fair value through profit or loss – FVTPL

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Financial assets through profit or loss

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income as described above are measured at FVTPL.

Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income are recognised in profit or loss.

The Company's financial assets measured at FVTPL comprise listed investments over which they do not have significant influence nor control.

(g) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Contributions are made by the Company to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(h) ADOPTION OF NEW AND REVISED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

During the current year, the Company adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations which became mandatory. The adoption of these Standards has not had a significant impact on the recognition, measurement and disclosure of transactions.

(i) NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS FOR APPLICATION IN FUTURE PERIODS

The AASB has issued new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods. The company has decided against early adoption of these Standards but does not expect the adoption of these standards to have any significant impact on the reported position or performance of the Company.

NOTE 2: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

No transactions between related parties were conducted save for services provided by directors at no fee.

NOTE 3 EVENTS OCCURRING AFTER THE REPORTING DATE

The financial report was authorised for issue on 12 September 2022 by the Directors.
